Dear Friends,

As in the past, I am sending these special Remembrance Day stories to help our community honour our local heroes. This year we remember the 200th Anniversary of the War of 1812. As well, I have highlighted the 95th Anniversary of the Battles of Passchendaele, 95th Anniversary of Vimy Ridge and the 70th Anniversary of the Dieppe Raid to ensure that each year we share new stories of importance with our community.

### STORIES FROM OUR LOCAL HEROES

# 90th: Leslie Smith was born Sept. 4, 1922, in Grimsby, England. He has six children, 11 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. He is

celebrating his 90th birthday with family.

## Leslie Smith

(R.A.S.C., WWII)

Born September 4th 1922 was enlisted into Service of the R.A.S.C. September 4th, 1940 on his 18th birthday. He served in Scotland, India, and Burma with the 928th T.T. Coy. R.A.S.C.



(928th Tank Transportation Company) He was a Sergeant in rank and stayed in India for 6 months after the war ended for Police action, returning home at Christmas. After the war he was a Police Officer in Leeds England and immigrated to Canada 5 years later. He worked for Avro Aero then as a Firefighter for the Pearson Airport until he was promoted to Chief and transferred to Windsor Airport where he stayed until retirement in 1983. During that time he was also Assistant Airport Manager and Disaster Coordinator for Essex County.

### Smith Remembers...

"WW2 was a devastating time of my life. I was shipped off at 18 years of age and saw many horrors one of which was watching an air raid at an airport in England, where our women's core was totally gunned down and we were left to clean up the remains from the tarmac. It is a time in my life I really do not wish to remember."

## OID YOU KNOW?

The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier of Ottawa contains the remains of an unidentified Canadian soldier from the First World War. Laurel leaves are engraved on top of the tomb. Laurel branches are also found on the Canadian National Vimy Memorial in Trance. Today, laurel leaves are also considered to be a symbol of peace.
